PURPOSE

1. To inform Council of the result of public engagement and consultation conducted on the Draft Long Term Plan 2025-2034 and for Council to hear from individuals or organisations who have requested to speak to their submissions.

BACKGROUND

- 2. The formal consultation on the Draft Long Term Plan (LTP) was carried out from 1 April 2025 to 5 May 2025.
- 3. The Local Government Act (2002) sets the requirements for formal consultation for the LTP, including the development of a LTP Consultation Document that provides an effective basis for community engagement in Council's decision-making processes relating to the content of the LTP 2025-2034. LTP Consultation is required to use the Special Consultative Procedure as the statutory minimum procedure.
- 4. Extensive engagement and consultation on the Draft Long Term Plan 2025-2034 has included:
 - a. A four week advertising campaign across traditional print and social media highlighting key issues and key dates during the consultation period;
 - b. Six community chat events around the Waimate District where Councillors and staff where out and about to discuss Council's proposals, resulting in direct engagement with approximately 60 members of the community:
 - c. The front page of Council's Website provided a link to a menu for LTP information, the LTP Consultation Document, submission form and viewing proposed rates on-line.

LONG TERM PLAN 2025-2034 SUBMISSIONS

- 5. Submissions on the Draft Long Term Plan 2025-2034 closed on 5 May 2025 at 12pm, with 90 submissions received (submissions attached).
- 6. 20 responses indicated that they wish to speak to Council regarding the content of their submission.
- 7. Council will convene on Tuesday 27 May 2025 to make their decisions regarding the Long Term Plan 2025-2034 Consultation.

My earnings and risk are nothing like the restaurant. I understand the system is forced upon council by MPI and takes money to implement- but surely there is a better way of distributing the costs involved rather than just an across the board blanket fee. On the 8th May I am presenting at parliament to the submissions committee to try and get the category of Low Risk- redefined and recognized as low risk for food items- not low risk of box ticking. I also organize NZ Registered Cake Businesses- recently there has been a huge increase of fees throughout NZ. All this fee increase has done is make people drop out of the food industry regulation system and go underground - operating illegally due to rising costs and stupid MPI regs that dont add up or are so open to interpretation they are misconstrued and distorted by each verifier at audit time. It is only ever the honest that pays- it is making people quit the system and operate backyard businesses- how is this helping food safety? It is also a point to note that each and every food business registered will be whacked with an additional yearly cost imposed by MPI - we have assumed this will also be forced onto councils to collect on MPI's behalf- This cost is killing small business and is again distributed as a blanket cost no matter what size your business is. Just think- if "Jean" down the road wants to make pots of jam to sell at the local farmers market- and she wants to make it legally- how many pots of jam will she have to make to recoup her costs with council fees, audit costs and the new MPI levy? Or will she just go ahead and make her jam in a kitchen no auditor has been thru and no audit process has ever taken place and ignore the system because councils do not have the time/money or resources to catch her doing it illegally. How is this system fair to the small business?

None of the options presented are acceptable. It is not appropriate that Council provide options to smooth the load, but no option to reduce the load. The rates increase forecast for 2029 is 2.9%, whilst the increase for 2026 ranges from 6.4% to 9.2%, depending on the option. The capital expenditure includes \$8 million 'service improvements' in 2026, and less than \$0.5 million in 2027, and less than \$2 million in 2028 and 2029. Why the massive fluctuations? Why not defer some of the \$8 million by a year or so? If expenditure was categorised, we would be able to look at the non-mandatory/non-critical spending and determine which items could be culled or delayed. When costs are escalating, the very first option should always be to reduce discretionary spending. \$8 million of "necessary" upgrades and renewals in one year requires significant scaling back of non-essential spending - including (as stated in the budget of 15 April meeting agenda) the \$31,000 Christmas tree. We need to know which fund is being used for each item of expenditure listed in that budget, in order to identify non-essential rate-payer funded activity.


Councillors may recognise the value their pet dog brings to their own lives but have not translated this understanding into the wider public health and well-being agenda.



In 2004 with support of community and various agencies and grants the area was scoped and restored from an illegal dumping ground, fire hazard and waste land into a recreational and ecological reserve that benefits people, businesses, recreation, sport, education, tourism, and the environment. The island today has native plantings, a shelter and display bridge constructed from historic bridge beams, jet boat ramp, display boards, a photographic and information signage trail on local history, renewable energy, ecology, and aquatic life, picnic areas, easily accessible fishing, a spur link for A2O and more recently a disc golf course. The Island attracts many visitors, tourists, events, school parties and provides easy accessibility to the mighty Waitaki River, vital to Civil Defense in case of emergency. In maintaining this area, the Waimate DC provides a contractor mowing grant for the large grass land and the Waitaki DC an equal grant for contractors to undertake spraying, road and tree, picnic area maintenance. We undertake four mows annually and wish for this to continue. We appreciate these contributions given the importance/ popularity of the Island to the local and wider community and the associated revenue benefits. 2. Combined funding with the Waitaki District Council for the Kurow Information Centre. The WVCS operates the Kurow Information Centre (KIC) based at 57 Bledisloe Street in Kurow, the building also includes the Kurow museum and the West Wing, a self contained small meeting room utilized by other community and not for profit groups for free. KIC offers a variety of services to the wider community, including the Hakataramea Valley (printing, technical advice, council information, NZTA services, Community Car bookings for hospital trips, etc.). Waimate District Council Long term plan 25-34 The Waihaorunga water scheme committee take this opportunity to provide feedback to the plans outlined in the planning document, and also the sharing of information at the meeting held at the Events centre on April 29. Firstly we acknowledge the quality provision of the water supply and associated R&M that goes with keeping the water flowing. We thank the team for the consistently good job they do in running the scheme on a daily basis, week in and week out all year. The committee itself has not met, and has not had the contact with council to fully preview, review, nor propose ideas or plans with regards the scheme. This is disappointing for rural schemes that were built by farmers for farmers and, who have in the past, through elected committees, believed that they had some input and control over how it all operates. It seems we are not alone as a committee in feeling this way. We appreciate that there is a lot happening in the water space, and prescribed solutions last year are now this years stale sandwiches. However as a committee we cannot offer opinions on what we don't know about. This really needs to change... We also as a committee have in the past had the privilege (if that's the right word) of being part of setting budgets, and planning scheme 'stuff'. Now we are just lumped in with the general melee and asked to submit to the plan. This undervalues the interest and investment that committee members put into the role. With the LTP coming before consultation on preferred water management option, and before confirmation of Taumata Arowai proposal for point of use treatment in small rural schemes, we can only speculate somewhat on where we will be in 12 months, and indeed 5 years. Council must also face this dilemma? So how do you build the financial model with such vast yet vague dimensions? We hope there has been a typo, and a couple of extra 0's got added into the capital spend for the Waihaorunga budget. We hope also that the way forward for our small scheme is a pragmatic but effective point of use treatment to enhance primary treatment at source. (Perhaps it is a role for the committee to make sure there is uptake of point of use treatment) How much should this cost? Well not as much as is proposed! There is real distress among consumers around the overall cost, ie the cost each rateable property pays for the ready supply of restricted water to the gate, and we see by the plan that over the life of the plan we go from \$193k through to \$350k in total annual rate take. That's 80% more. So average property around 15000 litres per day paying about 10k will be looking at 18k by the end of the plan, and the plan is front loaded, (the biggest jumps come early) so will be paying 16k in 4 years time. This alone councillors is not sustainable! We note the proposed capital spend for the scheme starts with a \$1.2m upgrade in treatment, and we were somewhat hopeful that if we do soon move to point of use treatment that this nightmare number would reduce (we note in the Asett management plan that the whole scheme is valued at \$1.4m) so we are talking the equivalent of a new scheme, but this spend is only for treatment. However at the combined scheme meeting on April 29, it was suggested that we not expect too much reduction in capital spend . Yikes! At a 5% interest rate, this alone adds 22c/l just to service the debt, let alone pay it back. What we are saying here is that this size of legacy debt is too much for the size

of the ratepayer pool. We are a scheme that is not expanding, nor likely to, as recognized also in the asset management plan, so any capital spend is spread over existing users without opportunity to mitigate or defray by increasing units sold. On a more positive note, The point of use treatment option is supported by our committee, along with user responsibility for fitting and maintenance of treatment systems. We also agree with the approach taken on renewals, that unless they are critical elements of the scheme, then waiting until they fail before replacing is a pragmatic approach, and one we would / do employ ourselves in our own water networks While working towards a gold plated water network is a laudable approach, we must cut the cloth to suit or face the scenario of existing customers leaving the scheme, making it even less viable. Which Segway's nicely into this next part... The loss of water services by council in either a CCO alone, or with other LA's perhaps also leads to reductions in economies of scale for the larger council entity. But can we keep a lid on rates rises for water? Looking at the upcoming consultation regarding service provision Entity, our gut reaction is to keep it in house. We see little in the way of efficiency gains for the small rural schemes of having a larger entity manage them. There is a skilled team on the job now, with local knowledge and who live in our community. The loss of such people when amalgamation occurs, affects more than just the person redeployed. Also there is the larger consideration of the overall efficiency of our district council if it does not own and manage the water networks. While the organization may seem top heavy now, without the waters portfolio it would be totally bloated. The cost efficiencies modelled, we think, are overstated in the joint WSO case. Realistically a saving in interest is going to be 1% or less, and in materials and contractors rates perhaps 25% at best. But some extra overhead like management layers and travel / equipment relocation would cost more. So just how such a lower cost over time per connection drops out of the model should be questioned by Councillors. The in house model does have risk too. Especially if there is larger and quicker expansion of water networks in the district, with design skills needed, and borrowing. Risk also of overheads- which are already significant for rural status quo (in terms of connections and volume sold) schemes, become even more burdensome with expected oversight and separate financial reporting functions. I guess we are looking for some assurance that we are not entering another spiralling cycle of costs whichever model we endorse. No matter the path ultimately chosen by council, some rationalization of the individual rural water scheme committee structure should be considered at the same time. We will make submissions to these options when Council goes to consultation. In summary, We want back into the tent. We want to be a part of planning, decisions, and problem solving, we want to keep it running smoothly, and we want to keep it affordable James Gibson Chairman Waihaorunga water scheme committee

We appreciate that this request to increase Bushtown's annual grant has been included in the Long Term Plan and put before the Public as a transparent consultation and feedback opportunity.



To receive ratepayer funding at all is questionable. If Ratepayers & District wish to donate money to any cause or charity - it is their choice. Strawberry Fare:- this is of course a major recognised annual event within our District. It is run as an organised commercial event with fees and charges expected to meet costs. Currently stall holder fees are in the vicinity of \$100 per plot with I believe over 200 plots. The Council is now giving monies to this organisation on a yearly basis with no overview on costs, payments and the spending of the profits made.

Lagree with the proposed Community housing remission removal - creating a more equal distribution of costs across all ratepayers within the town ship area. I disagree with the proposal to create a rate remission scheme on racial grounds within this District. The preamble suggesting "We are aware of only a handful of properties in our District that could qualify however this is subject to review and supporting information being made available" is a major red flag in this area that New Zealand is now facing. I would remind Councillors that "more than \$180 million to smooth the path of re-consenting their Waitaki hydro scheme" has recently taken place that will result in increased charges for our residents for their power supply. It is stated that this policy is being considered with reference to the principles set out in the Preamble to Te Ture Whenua Māori Act 1993 - these are.. "Whereas the Treaty of Waitangi established the special relationship between the Maori people and the Crown: And whereas it is desirable that the spirit of the exchange of kawanatanga for the protection of rangatiratanga embodied in the Treaty of Waitangi be reaffirmed: And whereas it is desirable to recognise that land is a taonga tuku iho of special significance to Maori people and, for that reason, to promote the retention of that land in the hands of its owners, their whanau, and their hapu, and to protect wahi tapu: and to facilitate the occupation, development, and utilisation of that land for the benefit of its owners, their whanau, and their hapu: And whereas it is desirable to maintain a court and to establish mechanisms to assist the Maori people to achieve the implementation of these principles." I have no objection to land covered under wāhi tapu, I suspect that the Maori Cemetery on Point Bush Road and any other within the District are already covered. However the wording " it is desirable to maintain a court and to establish mechanisms to assist the Maori people to achieve the implementation of these principles" could easily lead to any residence or property owned by a "Maori descendant" receiving rate relief at the expense of all other rate payers within the District. It appears from my research into the matter that the Waitangi Tribunal did not rule against any application in 2024. kāwanatanga 1. (loan) (noun) government, dominion, rule, authority, governorship, province rangatiratanga 1. Q23. Do you have any other feedback on the draft Long Term Plan 2025-2034?

Yes, I wish to speak at the public meeting. I would congratulate the Council in that this time last year the proposed rate increase for this coming year was listed as 13.4% and for 3 years at 28.9% It appears that now the figure is now 9.2% and 21.2% for the 3 years. In the words of many school teachers - has showed improvement but could still do better. Last year I pointed out how the past rate increases are well in excess of the inflation rate at 164.47% - inflation ending 31 March 2025 was officially 2.5% so once again this Council is well above the pace. It should be obvious to you all that people are struggling and that money is not being freely spent as freely as in the past. I have just walked both sides of our Main Business Street in the District, Queen Street here in the Waimate Township. By my count there were 56 active Business and Retail shops but also 12 empty premises. Of those active we have 6 shops of either second hand goods or Op shops. The last significant actions have been the closing of two retail shops and the movement of one shop to bigger premises - this was a "\$2" shop. Perhaps those figures are an indication of the health of our community in these times. Does it feel like we are on the bow of the good ship SS Waimate as it ploughs through the icebergs of the residents and business of the good people of the Waimate District.. An answer: Zero-based budgeting (ZBB) is a budgeting method where all expenses, regardless of previous spending, must be justified for each new budget period, starting from a "zero base". It requires a thorough analysis of an organization's needs and costs to allocate funds effectively, rather than relying on historical spending patterns. I have a good deal of personal involvement in this. I note the lifts of rating requirements that are within the document - but not mentioned in the discussion document. External interest :+ 1.8% Surely interest rates have and are dropping. Rateable overheads + 0.9% The type of funding that allows staffing levels to go from 50 in 2019 to 60 in 2023. All other items + 2.0% Based on last years figures each 1% increase equated to \$160,761 so this is a \$321,522 unaccounted for slush fund.

Q11. Key issue 1: Please comment on why

It is positive that Council has put this issue forward as a topic for consultation. The capacity of many ratepayers to fund significant rate increases in the short term is limited particularly in the light of post-Covid inflation and high interest rates. Given that Council is within the debt limit set by the Local Government Funding Agency it is reasonable to suggest that lending could ease the impact of operating and capital costs and therefore top line rates increases. Noting the 17%+ rate increase on the higher value rural properties in Rating Zone 2, arising from it seems the cost of targeted rates as council meets the challenge of new water regulations, is a concern. Rural ratepayers could surely do with some smoothing of rates increases over time, to assist with affordability. That said, we want to see Council with options to fall back on in the event of difficulties in the future. The imperative of maintaining and upgrading the rural water schemes needs to be sorted as efficiently as possible, while staying ahead of growing road maintenance costs. We therefore support Option 1, Council's preferred option. This is the more sustainable option in the long run, for ratepayers.

It is unfortunate that this shortfall arises from NZTA only providing \$19.71m of the \$22.36m sought by Council. Council is asking whether to proceed with its existing road budget, increase it with more rates, or reduce council funding for local roads and footpaths over the next two years. We think it an important principle that road and footpath maintenance be co-funded by NZTA to the maximum reasonable extent. With rural ratepayers already facing considerable rate hikes we support Council's preferred option, Option 1. This balances the need to avoid deterioration of the network with affordability. Raising more rates to cover what NZTA won't fund potentially sets an unfortunate precedent.



Local Water Done Well: Federated Farmers has been involved in the consultation on the three waters issue in recent years, and we're very aware of the challenges rural drinking water schemes face with the cost of compliance with new drinking water regulations and standards. It is good to see council budgeting to meet the rural water challenge, with rural water contributing around 19.5% of this year's rate increase and \$6.62 million in the major project budget for rural water compliance upgrades. Drivers of rates increases: The information on pages 26 and 27 of the Consultation Document reflects its good level of transparency. It can be very difficult to pin down the reasons for rates increases in other jurisdictions where Federated Farmers local executives submit; this section breaking down the 9.2% rate increase is appreciated.

- 1. Thank you for the opportunity to make a submission on the Waimate District Council's Draft Long Term Plan 2025-2034 (the Plan).
- Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga (HNZPT) is an autonomous Crown Entity with statutory responsibility under the Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga Act 2014 (HNZPTA) for the identification, protection, preservation, and conservation of New Zealand's historic and cultural heritage.
- 3. The specific parts of the Plan that this submission relates to are: $\frac{1}{2}$
 - Council incentives to generate awareness and understanding of heritage
 - Proposed initiatives that affect places on the New Zealand Heritage List / Rārangi Kōrero
 - Other incentives to facilitate repair and maintenance and seismic strengthening of heritage buildings

General approach

- HNZPT acknowledges the challenge of preparing this Plan in a period of change and uncertainty, with legislative reforms and current financial pressures.
- 5. HNZPT recognises that the Long Term Plan is a high-level document to provide direction for development initiatives and funding within the city and wider district. Within that, the Council has a responsibility to acknowledge the various tangible and intangible aspects of life that make up its heritage and ensure that these are appropriately represented within the Plan. Cared for historic heritage is essential in creating an engaging vibrant region that fosters local identity, draws people in and helps to sustain the local economy. It is a fundamental part of the fabric of the community.
- 6. HNZPT supports the strategic framework within the Plan for community outcomes through the upgrading of public amenities and facilities to benefit the growing population and benefit community wellbeing. HNZPT also supports the strategic planning for infrastructure and services

to ensure they meet a safe standard and are fit-for-purpose long term. In particular, Council's priorities for the district's roading and footpaths, water, stormwater and wastewater management will benefit the community by improving road safety and attending to current challenges with the service systems.

- 7. HNZPT commends the Council's consistent effort and contribution to heritage protection throughout the Plan with reserved funds and provisions to incentivise preservation and conservation. In particular, HNZPT is strongly supportive of the Council's continued effort to incentivise the preservation and conservation of historic heritage throughout the district through provision of the annual Heritage Grant and rates remissions as detailed in Section 8 of the Rates Remission and Postponement Policy.
- HNZPT recognises the importance of engagement with iwi to promote partnership, participation and protection. As such, we support the Council's plan to continue the implementation of the existing Statement on Involvement of Māori from the Waimate District Long Term Plan 2021-2031.

Initiatives:

9. HNZPT appreciates the extensive staged development of a 67km loop trail that showcases both spectacular scenery and significant heritage spaces in Waimate. HZNPT acknowledges the Council's effort to promote the connection between the natural resources, places which hold historical importance in Waimate and community engagement. Continued use and maintenance contribute to the longevity of our historic resources, as such, HNZPT supports Option 1 of Key Issue 3 (Track Funding) which aims to provide \$150,000 from the Subdivision Recreation Reserve Contribution Fund with no impact on rates due to inclusion within the financial forecast.

Incentives:

- 10. HNZPT strongly supports adaptive reuse to enable heritage buildings that may no longer be suitable for their original use, to be appropriately adapted. This can ensure their longevity, and we encourage Council to consider this option for their buildings.
- 11. Waimate District contains twenty-six heritage items listed on the New Zealand Heritage List / Rārangi Kōrero. Many of the district's heritage items are privately owned, yet still contribute to the community sense of belonging and way of life. Financing maintenance, repairs, strengthening and upgrading of these structures can often be financially challenging for private owners. As such, HNZPT supports the continued effort of the Council to provide the Heritage Grant allowing for the care of the District's historic heritage.
- 12. In direct relation to Question 1 for the Annual Grants, HNZPT supports the continued provision of the Council Heritage Grant. HNZPT strongly supports the provision of the Heritage Grant as a form of incentive to encourage the protection of the district's heritage. Maintenance, repair and upgrading of heritage structures can create financial challenges for owners, as such, HNZPT supports the assistance provided by the Heritage Grant to continue the preservation and conservation of historic heritage. HNZPT also supports the proposed additional \$1,000 per annum requested as this provides further financial assistance for heritage protection.
- 13. While HNZPT also supports the assistance provided by this grant to the Bushtown Waimate Incorporation, we would also support the availability of some of this funding for private owners

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of heritage listed or scheduled items. Approximately half of the listed heritage items within the district are located on privately owned land. As such, HNZPT would support consideration of some funding availability for other applicants, particularly private owners. As stated above, financing the maintenance, repairs, strengthening and upgrading of heritage structures and buildings can often be financially challenging for private owners. As such, in relation to Question 2 in the Annual Grants Section, HNZPT supports the financial assistance provided to Bushtown Waimate Inc. and also encourages the Council's consideration of assistance to private heritage property owners.

- 14. HNZPT supports Section 8.0 Land owned by party voluntarily preserving or enhancing natural / Historical / Cultural features within the Rates Remission and Postponement Policy. This incentivises the preservation and conservation of heritage items and therefore encourages owners to continue the use and maintenance of listed or scheduled heritage items.
- 15. In addition, HNZPT supports the remission of rates for Community Halls, Centres, Sporting and Recreation facilities as outlined in Section 5.0 of the Rates Remission and Postponement Policy. HNZPT commends the Council's recognition of the public good made by such organisations, pledge to assist the organisations survival and encouragement the accessibility of membership to the general public including disadvantage groups. St Patrick's Church (Catholic) on Timaru Road and St Augustine's Church (Anglican) on John Street are both noted as qualifying properties under this category of rates remission. HNZPT supports the inclusion of these properties for the remission of rates given both churches are listed as Category 1 Historic Places in the New Zealand Heritage List / Rārangi Kōrero and hold significant heritage values to the District.
- 16. Further to the above incentives, there are other provisions which may also promote the protection and conservation of historic heritage. HNZPT supports incentivising mechanisms such as free or subsidised processing of applications involving the maintenance, repair or upgrading of heritage places. HNZPT encourages Council's consideration of assistance to heritage building owners through additional methods to promote continued protection of heritage.

Recommendations

- 17. Further to the priorities and proposed initiatives outlined in the Plan, HNZPT requests consideration of the following methods to protect and enhance Waimate's historic heritage.
 - Council recognises adverse effects of climate change on historic heritage and implements measures to prevent further degradation wherever possible.
 - Council considers other grant recipients to assist private owners of heritage properties with repairs, maintenance and strengthening.
 - Council considers further heritage incentives to facilitate the retention and seismic strengthening of heritage buildings such as free or subsidised processing of applications and free advice to owners of heritage properties.

Canterbury Regional Council welcomes the opportunity to make a submission on your draft Long-Term Plan 2025-34.

We would particularly like to comment on three matters: drinking water supply in Lower Waihao, management of risk from historic landfills, and relationships with mana whenua.

Drinking water supply

You have noted providing a continuous supply of drinking water to meet agreed demands as one of your priorities and challenges for the period of this long-term plan and we are pleased to note investment in drinking water compliance upgrades included under major projects.

With elevated nitrate concentrations in drinking water supply of the Lower Waihao rural water scheme, it is a vital that we continue to work together to improve services for the community. Canterbury Regional Council compliance staff have been very active in the catchment, focusing on ongoing compliance and consents work. We are keeping the Lower Waitaki South Coastal Canterbury Water Zone Committee up to date on our actions, and Te Rūnanga o Waihao is being kept up-to-date directly by our compliance team.

We urge you to continue to prioritise work on your rural and urban drinking water supply infrastructure to improve the situation for the community now and into the future.

Land fill management

With the successful funding bid to central government for planning to remediate a historical South Canterbury landfill at St Andrews Beach, Canterbury Regional Council has worked closely with the Waimate District Council and Te Rūnanga o Waihao to develop an action plan to mitigate the risk.

Given the potential significance and cost impacts of this mahi, it would be good to see this work and required investment more clearly reflected in your Long-Term Plan so the community can appreciate the action underway.

Building partnership with mana whenua

Greater alignment, coordination and partnership between Councils and mana whenua is vital to progress better outcomes for our communities and environment. Accordingly, we encourage you to continue building your Council's relationship with Te Rūnanga o Waihao and to reflect this commitment in your Long-Term Plan. I recognise your Council is embarking on this journey and reiterate our continued offer of support and coordination to help you.



Waimate District Council Long Term Plan 2025 - Submission The role of Equestrian's Advocacy is to advocate on behalf of equestrians across the Canterbury and West Coast region. Our focus is to work with decision makers in local, regional and central government on all matters of inclusion, access and road safety. Formerly known as Canterbury Equestrian Advocacy Group, we have submitted and participated in all local council 2024 Long Term Plans in Canterbury. This includes Hurunui, Kaikoura, Waimakariri, Selwyn, Timaru and McKenzie territorial authorities. Our recent change in name reflects our broader role in advocacy for the West Coast and represents a strong united voice for equestrians in our region. Our group is active and have representatives in many of the TA locations we give voice to. In the Waimate District, our group member and local equestrian Julie Dee can provide a connection to the Waimate equestrian community. Equestrian's Advocacy request to be a stakeholder in the 2025 LTP and any other relevant reviews going forward. We will support and provide input and guidance on all matters that involve equestrians, specifically around off-road pathway inclusion, multi- use trail proposals, and road safety. Equestrian's Advocacy requests that Waimate District Council provide equal inclusion, consideration and funding for recreational horse riding in infrastructure planning, design, and construction as it does with other recreational user groups. We ask that council planning and staff take an inclusive multi user approach to any future spend on spaces and places and include horse riders alongside cyclists and walkers where practicable. We acknowledge that not all projects will be workable, but we do believe there are examples where supporting all passive recreational user groups to be safely active in their community is achievable, with good educational and marketing support. We ask that there is an inclusiveness in policy for future trail plans and that there is consultation and provision for horse rider access where possible as well as for other user groups. Key Issue 3 Track Funding on the LTP We applaud and support councils conditions that the delivery and use of this funding is executed responsibly and delivering outcomes that align with the recreation reserve funds purpose of enhancing recreational spaces for the benefit of everyone. And would fully support Option 1, (that council contributes the full proposed amount of \$150,000 from the subdivision recreation reserve contribution fund) if Waimate2gether were held accountable to show a willingness to be fully inclusive of all user groups, including horse riders moving forward where practicable. Equestrian's Advocacy would like it noted that Waimate2gether have not demonstrated an inclusiveness approach to date. We acknowledged that parts of the Waimate Trail are better suited for cyclists only, but would like assurance that where practicable a section could potentially include a horse riding berm or side loop to make this great Waimate Trail project a truly multi user trail that would attract more users to Waimate and would truly enhance our recreational spaces for the benefit of everyone. Lets not focus on what cannot be done but on what can be done when we work together. We ask that Waimate District Council uses its own networks to also advocate for horse rider inclusion. For example, Environment Canterbury has Regional Parks that cater for walking, cycling and horse riding in the Waimakariri and Selwyn districts. A perfect example in

the Waimate District would be WDC working with a representative group of eguestrian users for Knottingley Park. We ask that your council's road safety and roading team look to actively support equestrian road safety messaging to educate the public on how to approach and pass a horse and rider on the road. Pass Wide and Slow New Zealand have resources and permanent road safety platform for our community. We ask that Waimate District Council consult with local Equestrian's Advocacy representative Julie Dee on this. We have identified specific public road locations where we suggest that additional signage to warn people to be on the lookout for horse riders would increase safety for all road users. In August 2024, the Canterbury Regional Transport Committee gave unanimous support for horse riders to be recognised formally as Vulnerable Road Users. We ask that Waimate District Council bear this in mind when considering the above. We ask that Waimate District Council take a proactive role in ensuring unformed legal road access is retained and to work with the equestrian community on any identified areas of improved public access. The horse riding and carriage driving community relies on the goodwill of regional and local councils to fund bridleways or give permission for pathways to be multi-use. There is no co-funding arrangement that exists between Waka Kotahi and councils to provide safe alternative pathways for horse riders as there is for cycling and walking projects and programmes. Sadly, this has led to many councils Walking and Cycling Strategies not including bridleways or providing for horse riders in their communities. We encourage Waimate District Council to take an inclusive approach to all passive recreational users, like the recent update to the Hurunui District 2050 Strategy. Council's Walking and Riding https://www.hurunui.govt.nz/repository/libraries/id:23wyoavbi17q9ssstcjd/hierarchy/Support_Services/Strategies/Walking%2 0and%20Riding%20Strategy Bridleway is a physically separated off road path for horse riders for which motor vehicles do not have access. Cyclists and pedestrians may have shared access. Horse riding promotes health and wellbeing. It is an active, healthy, inclusive and a social recreational pursuit chosen by many, where age and ability poses no barrier to explore and enjoy our great outdoors. There is the opportunity for Waimate District Council to explore the economic development of equestrian tourism within its Tourism Strategy. We know there is an untapped and unique tourism opportunity for the Canterbury/ West Coast region. It could be as easy as creating a place for travelling horse riders to stay, ride and explore. The horse-riding community brings much needed revenue to farmers, feed merchants, saddlery outfitters and outlets, vets, trailer/float/truck companies, farriers, haulage companies, fuel stations, car dealerships, construction companies for barns and stables - strengthening local economies. We are also the community's teachers, emergency personnel, young people and retirees. Conclusion It is important to the equestrian community that Waimate District is a place where residents young and old can participate in their chosen recreational pursuit of horse riding. To be able to continue this we need to be included in all planning of parks, open spaces and any connections between our individual communities and coastline. Thank you for the opportunity to introduce our group to you and to share our areas of focus. We trust this will be the start of a positive and proactive relationship and that we will all see the benefits of the recreational horse-riding community being included and taking an active role in decision making. 

Premise

New Zealand's councils face increasing financial pressures, balancing infrastructure investment, housing needs, climate action, and rising costs. The funding required to get ahead of these challenges is significant—and traditional revenue streams alone may not be enough.

A strong philanthropic strategy presents a key opportunity to supplement council efforts and enhance Waimate's ability to invest in community wellbeing both now and for generations to come.

Current Situation

Aoraki Foundation's Role

Since 2009, the Aoraki Foundation has supported vital community projects, but like many charities, it under-invested in itself for years. Operating on a lean annual budget of less than \$70,000, fund growth was slow.

A strategic shift in 2022 has accelerated our trajectory:



- 113% growth in funds over three years (16 new funds, \$3.4 million)
- Bequest commitments rising from \$1 million to \$15 million
- · Projected additional \$4 million in pipeline funding

This success is directly tied to increased investment in philanthropy, including the addition of a full-time gifting and community advisor. However, Waimate remains underrepresented in philanthropic giving.

Philanthropy in Waimate

Despite strong community support for local projects, donated endowment funds from Waimate remain minimal.

- The largest contribution came from St. Andrews Golf Course after its closure.
- Individual donations have been few, mostly from trustees and those directly affiliated with the Foundation.
- Bequest pledges are limited—only two future gifts have been committed.

Encouraging philanthropy within Waimate District would ensure more funds are available for local benefit, rather than relying solely on funds donated from outside the region for all of South Canterbury, like the Miller and McKay Funds.

Given the unprecedented intergenerational wealth transfer ahead—New Zealand's total inheritance is projected to reach \$1.6 trillion by 2050, with Waimate's estimated share at \$2.56 billion—the community has a major opportunity to grow long-term funding for local needs

Opportunities

Funding Waimate's Future

Philanthropic models have been highly successful worldwide and across Aotearoa.

- Acorn Foundation (Tauranga) now manages \$100 million in assets and will distribute \$4 million next year.
- By 2050, they are expected to surpass \$1 billion in community funds.

The Aoraki Foundation can mobilize Waimate's generosity similarly—ensuring more local gifts remain invested for local benefit rather than leaving the region.

Community-Led, Council-Enabled Projects

Philanthropy has already proven cost-effective, swift, and impactful in South Canterbury.

- The Centennial Pump Track in Timaru was 40% Council-funded, yet fully built in under six weeks.

 Leveraging community support alongside council investment can stretch local budgets further.

A strong, well-resourced Aoraki Foundation could act as a connector, working alongside Waimate District Council to identify high-potential community-led projects.

Council-Led, Community-Enabled Projects

Large-scale infrastructure projects—like CBay and the Waimate Event Centre—are too big to be fully driven by volunteers but benefit greatly from philanthropic fundraising.

 The Aoraki Foundation has successfully led multi-million-dollar campaigns before and can do so again, partnering with the Waimate District Council to enable funding for key initiatives.

Request

A unified and strategic approach is needed to foster long-term philanthropy in Waimate.

We request that the Waimate District Council host a workshop to:

- 1. Discuss how community philanthropy can supplement Council efforts.
- 2. Explore the Council's potential role in supporting local giving.
- 3. Identify key partnerships and funding strategies for Waimate's future.

Without a collective effort, Waimate risks missing an opportunity worth tens of millions. We believe a Council-led conversation can help unlock this potential and set Waimate on a path toward sustainable, community-driven funding.



Issues Increasing busy roads and fast traffic. Increase in Large Trucks & Dr. farm implements. Horses can act unpredicatably to large or fast moving traffic. Lost access to land due to farm & amp; urban development & amp; changing farming practises Loss of access to forestry and paper roads due to same. Loss of access also to exclusive cycle only "bridleways" Vulnerable Road User status for horse riders still pending with NZTA & Dyvernment Farm/ land owners have identified need & amp; demand and commercial value in horses riding on their land and so more are charging for this privilege. Not everyone has access to farm land or the contacts to ask for permission from private land owners. No sustainable long term plan in place for addressing these challenges in our district. Safety for our young and old riders alike and their treasured animal companions is becoming more of a huge risk riding on public roads. Horse riding provides a wonderful opportunity for us to experience the community and rural aspects and connect with others. There are many in our district whose mental & amp: physical wellness benefit from this. Many horses need regular exercise as obesity in horses can easily turn into a fatal condition. Needs 3km - 15km loops Surface: no shingle - just access & amp; single trail Low traffic to medium traffic ideally Horse Float Parking area Signs for all users awareness Contour: mid steep/rolling with some relief / flat Hills & amp; trees are a bonus! Proposal I propose a strategy that involves consultation with an appointed local equestrian working group representing different horse disciplines that have different sporting goals but all share common needs for safe space to train and exercise and enjoy their horses. I propose we identify more public safe areas to ride but we also need to protect, promote and enhance for riding the roads we already use. Identify / Protect/ Promote / Enhance Public Roads I have identified existing liked and used public road routes that are being frequented by horse riders currently. I would like to discuss with appropriate managers how we can protect, enhance & amp; promote these routes (signage). Paper Roads Routes that are or could be good for riding where access is being blocked or paper road access has been lost. Other Routes Work with DOC and fundraise to put in routes that all can enjoy. Knottingley Park Horses are welcome in the park but technically for quality of riding the ever growing low trees and other activities make it a wee bit challenging. Combined Users Track Proposal Proposal to put in a shingle track on side grass berm on Timaru Road (similar to the on Hakataramea Highway SH 82 between Mount John Road corner and Studholme Bush Car Park) from corner of Bathgate Road/Maytown Road to Champions Road corner. Many walkers / cyclists / horse riders enjoy the loop but this busy road is a prohibitor to many. This would provide a good safe link to town for those living in the rural suburb and also provides an additional exercise loop into a rural zone for those living in town.
