7.1 LOCAL WATER DONE WELL CONSULTATION DECISION

PURPOSE

1. To inform Council as to the result of the Local Water Done Well public engagement and consultation.

2. For Council to make a decision regarding which consultation option will form the basis of the Water Services Delivery Plan to be submitted to the Minister for Local Government by 3 September 2025.

BACKGROUND

- 3. The coalition government repealed legislation that had been established under the previous government and replaced it with new legislation enacting their Local Water Done Well policy. Although left to individual councils to decide overall arrangements for service delivery, the new approach is that water services must operate more like an independent utility business and will be subject to strict economic, environmental and water quality regulation.
- 4. The Local Government (Water Services Preliminary Arrangements) Act 2024 requires all councils to submit a Water Service Delivery Plan (WSDP) by 3 September 2025. Councils must consult on at least two options for the future of water service delivery from:
 - (a) Internal business unit or division: Continuation of the existing in-house service delivery model with new ring-fencing and financial sustainability requirements.
 - (b) Single council owned water organisation: Establishing a new company 100% owned by the council, with strengthened governance and management.
 - (c) Multi-council owned water organisation: Jointly owned company by multiple councils, offering potential economies of scale.
 - (d) Community trust owned: A wholly consumer trust owned water organisation, independent of council control.
 - (e) Mixed council and consumer trust owned: A water organisation part-owned by councils and a consumer trust, enabling financial independence while retaining some council ownership.
- 5. Council engaged MartinJenkins Consultants to prepare a series of reports to measure each model against the requirements of the Local Water Done Well legislation, namely, sufficiency of investment, funding and financing, affordability, and levels of service delivery.
- 6. On 29 April 2025, Council agreed to consult on two options, being:

Option 1: An internal water services unit (Council's preferred option) Keeping water services in-house and overseen by our Council, and

Option 2: Three-council water services organisation

Joining a new water services organisation with Mackenzie District Council and Timaru District Council.

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Public Consultation

- 7. Consultation was undertaken in compliance with the alternative requirements for consultation outlined in the Water Services Preliminary Arrangements Act. Sections 60-64 of the Act provides specific conditions and exemptions from corresponding requirements under the Local Government Act 2002.
- 8. Under the Water Services Preliminary Arrangements Act Section 63 this consultation may be used to fulfil the consultation requirements to amend Council's Long Term Plan if needed.
- 9. The consultation ran from 15 May 2025 to 16 June 2025.
- 10. The Consultation Document is available on the Council website at waimatedc.govt.nz/yourwater
- 11. Residents who have opted into Council's "Notify Me" and Engagement HQ systems were informed that consultation had opened.
- 12. Promotion of the Consultation Document included advertising in print media in such papers as the Waimate Trader, the Kurow Bugle, and 'Newsline' in the Timaru Courier. Social media included regular posting on Council's facebook page.
- 13. Nine 'Community Chat' sessions were held in various locations around the district, hosted by Councillors and Council staff. These are drop-in events provided a forum for members of the public to speak to Councillors and staff and ask any questions raised by the Consultation Document.
- 14. Hearings for those who wish to speak to their submission were held on 30 June 2025.

Consultation Results

- 15. Submissions on the Local Water Done Well 2025 closed on 16 June 2025 at 12pm, with 246 submissions received.
- 16. 17 submitters indicated that they wish to speak to Council regarding the content of their submission.
- 17. A summary of consultation results has been provided as an attachment to this agenda item.

ASSESSMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

18. The decisions outlined in the Consultation Document are of high significance and the consultation process was prepared in accordance with Council's responsibilities under the Local Government Act 2002, the Water Services Preliminary Arrangements Act 2024, and the 301 Significance and Engagement Policy.

CONSIDERATIONS

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Risk

22. A decision is required on 1 July 2025 so there is sufficient time for the development of a Water Services Delivery Plan which is required to be submitted to the Minister of Local Government by 3 September 2025.

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. That the Local Water Done Well Consultation Decision report is accepted; and
- 2. That Council decides which consultation option will form the basis of the Water Services Delivery Plan to be submitted to the Minister for Local Government by 3 September 2025.


